The strength of these studies derives primarily from nuanced examinations of the concerns and careers of particular African playwrights; the history, offerings, and fortunes of particular theatrical arenas, and close explorations of specific performances and texts. The foregrounding of correspondences in the dramaturgies and intellectual ferment of the continent critically accentuates equally

privileged regional, historical, and other crucial specificities. Situated in time and place while under-scoring the political and intellectual inter-sections of a shared history of colonial-ism, the contributions to Syncretic Arenas, individually and collectively, reveal the transformations and growing strengths of postcolonialism as an analytical strategy. Isidore Diala is Professor of African literature in the Department of English and Literary Studies at Abia State University, Uturu, and author of *Esiaba Irobi's Drama and the Postcolony: Theory and Practice of Postcolonial Performance* (2013).

The human genome refers to the complete set of nucleic acid sequences in humans. These are encoded as DNA within the chromosomes in cell nuclei and the DNA molecule in each mitochondrion. The genome is organized into 22 pairs of chromosomes, plus a combination of X and X chromosomes for females, and a combination of X and Y chromosomes for males. The human genome comprises of both protein-coding DNA genes and noncoding DNA. There are approximately between 19,000-20,000 protein-coding genes. These account for only 1.5% of the genome, while the rest is associated with non-coding RNA molecules, introns, SINEs, LINEs, regulatory DNA sequences and those sequences for which no function has been determined as yet. Studies have shown that most noncoding DNA within the human genome have associated biochemical activities such as regulation of gene expression, control of epigenetic inheritance and organization of chromosome architecture. The human genome is the first vertebrate to be completely sequenced. The resulting data

has applications in anthropology, biomedical science, forensics, etc. This book presents researches and studies performed by experts across the globe on the human gene. It elucidates the concepts and innovative models around prospective developments with respect to this area of study. It attempts to assist those with a goal of delving into genetics.

Perinatal Genetics: Diagnosis and Treatment brings together the proceedings of the 15 Annual New York State Health Department Birth Defects Symposium held on September 30-October 1, 1984 in Albany, New York. The symposium provided a forum for clarifying and rationalizing certain aspects of diagnosis and treatment of perinatal genetic birth defects such as fragile X syndrome, phenylketonuria, and hypothyroidism. Comprised of 17 chapters, this book begins with an epidemiological review of very early pregnancy loss, focusing on fertilization and implantation; the probability of loss between fertilization and implantation (on about the sixth day), and between implantation and the 14th day (the first day of the expected next period in a non-pregnant woman); and the contribution of chromosomal errors in the sperm, ovum, and zygote to early reproductive loss. The reader is then introduced to cytogenetic abnormalities in spontaneous abortions of recognized conceptions; repetitive spontaneous abortion; and prenatal genetic diagnosis by chorionic villus sampling. Subsequent chapters explore prenatal treatment of biochemical disorders; in vitro

fertilization and embryo transfer; and moral issues concerning third trimester pregnancy terminations. This monograph will appeal to perinatologists, neonatologists, obstetricians, pediatricians, and geneticists and should also serve as a useful guide for health professionals who provide care to pregnant women and their newborns.

Edmondo De Amicis (1846 - 1908) was an Italian novelist, journalist, poet and short-story writer. His best-known book is *Cuore*, a children's novel translated into English as *Heart*. De Amicis fought in the battle of Custoza during the Third Independence War, a defeat of Savoy forces against the Austrian Empire. In Florence, he wrote his first sketches dealing with his frontline experience, collected as *La vita militare* ("Military Life", 1868), and first published by the journal of the Ministry of Defense, *L'Italia Militare*. In 1870, he joined the staff of the journal *La Nazione* in Rome, and his correspondence at the time later served as base for his travel writings: *Spagna* (1873), *Olanda* (1874), *Ricordi di Londra* (1874), *Marocco* (1876), *Constantinople* (1878), *Ricordi di Parigi* (1879).

Neuberger's bold arguments and daring insights into every aspect of Eisenstein's work during this period, together with her ability to lucidly connect his wide-ranging late theory with his work on *Ivan*, show the director exploiting the institutions of Soviet artistic production not only to expose the cruelties of Stalin and his circle but to challenge the fundamental principles of Soviet ideology itself. *Ivan the Terrible*, she argues, shows us one of the world's greatest filmmakers and one of the 20th century's greatest artists observing the world around him and experimenting with every element of film art to explore the psychology of political ambition,

uncover the history of recurring cycles of violence and lay bare the tragedy of absolute power. In June 2015 we held a workshop on the beautiful island of Mallorca, Spain with a focus on sea level variability and change. Epigenetics is a relatively new field of science explaining heritable changes that are not caused by alterations in DNA sequences. Epigenetic modifications are acquired throughout life, and depend on environmental clues such as diet, lifestyle and toxin exposure. It is possible to pass down epigenetic modifications to the next generation of offspring if the modifications occur in sperm or egg cells. Additionally, epigenetic regulations are central to many cellular processes such as imprinting, X chromosome inactivation, DNA damage response, cellular reprogramming and senescence. This book provides an overview for the influence of early life

nutrition on the epigenome and the role of epigenetic dysregulations in the pathogenesis of many common diseases.

This volume sets out to analyse the relation between social media and politics by investigating the power of the internet and more specifically social media, in the political and social discourse.
