

Allen Testing And Cognitive Levels Caregiver Guide

The purpose of this study was to gather normative data on 10 and 11 year old children without disabilities through a comparison of scores on the Allen Cognitive Levels-Expanded Test (ACL-E) with scores on the Kaufman Brief Intelligence Test (K-BIT). The test scores were compared using the Spearman Rank Order Correlation. A significant correlation was found between the ACL-E and the K-BIT composite scores. Marginal significance was found between the ACL-E and the verbal and matrices subtests of the K-BIT. General linear model procedures were used to calculate gender differences in scores of both tests. No significant difference was noted based on gender. This study supported the ACL-E as a valid assessment tool for cognitive function in 10 and 11 year old children.

Consequently, the need for nursing for patients with fragility fracture across the world is immense. Fragility fracture is one of the foremost challenges for health care providers, and the impact of each one of those expected 9 million hip fractures is significant pain, disability, reduced quality of life, loss of independence and decreased life expectancy. There is a need for coordinated, multi-disciplinary models of care for secondary fracture prevention based on the increasing evidence that such models make a difference. There is also a need to promote and facilitate high quality, evidence-based effective care to those who suffer a fragility fracture with a focus on the best outcomes for recovery, rehabilitation and secondary prevention of further fracture. The care community has to

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understand better the experience of fragility fracture from the perspective of the patient so that direct improvements in care can be based on the perspectives of the users.
