Andrew Lang's Fairy Books - also known as Andrew Lang's "Coloured" Fairy Books or Andrew Lang's Fairy Books of Many Colors - are a twelve-book series of fairy tale collections. The irony of Lang's life and work is that although he wrote for a profession--literary criticism; fiction; poems; books and articles on anthropology, mythology, history, and travel ... he is best recognized for the works he did not write.

Andrew Lang (1844-1912) was a prolific Scots man of letters, a poet, novelist, literary critic and contributor to anthropology. He now is best known as the collector of folk and fairy tales. He was educated at the Edinburgh Academy, St Andrews University and at Balliol College, Oxford. As a journalist, poet, critic and historian, he soon made a reputation as one of the ablest and most versatile writers of the day. Lang was one of the founders of the study of "Psychical Research," and his other writings on anthropology include *The Book of Dreams and Ghosts* (1897), *Magic and Religion*

(1901) and *The Secret of the Totem* (1905). He was a Homeric scholar of conservative views. Other works include *Homer and the Epic* (1893); a prose translation of *The Homeric Hymns* (1899), with literary and mythological essays in which he draws parallels between Greek myths and other mythologies; and *Homer and his Age* (1906). He also wrote *Ballades in Blue China* (1880) and *Rhymes la Mode* (1884).
