We hope that the readership of the book will include high school students considering a career in private industry, law enforcement, intelligence agencies, or the military. A background in electronics, math, and computer science is helpful but not necessary in reading this book. We hope that this book changes you by increasing your understanding of electronic devices, investigation, and the justice system.
